To get eye-catching photos, focus your camera on these uncommon items.

And our final destination: **Ngong Ping!** Located in Tung Chung, we can get there by riding the iconic cable cars. You can take beautiful selfies in the cable car while riding over the lush green forest. After reaching Ngong Ping, we will immediately go to the Big Buddha. I believe sunset is the best time to take pictures of the Big Buddha, as during this time, the towering statue glows under the sun, its bronze body radiating over the misty Lantau hills. Do take wide-angle pictures to capture all the majesty of the Big Buddha.
